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«The Journal of Epigraphic Studies» accepts articles written in English, German, French, Italian or Spanish. Submitted articles are peer-reviewed by an international Editorial Committee. Articles should comply with the specific editorial rules of «The Journal of Epigraphic Studies» issued by the Scientific Committee and the publisher Fabrizio Serra editore Srl (see below).

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### *Epigraphic Critical Signs*

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### *Style*

- Every article should include an abstract in English, maximum of 100-150 words, and the translation of the title in English, if it is written in another language.
- Page layout should not be attempted and automatic text formatting should be avoided.
- Notes should be presented as footnotes. Footnote numbers should be placed outside the punctuation.
- Dates to be phrased this way, using small caps for the letters (for papers in English): 250 B.C. / 250 A.D.
- Centuries to be spelled out this way (for papers in English): the first century, the third century.
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- Quotations in angle brackets («...»); double quotes (“...”) for material inserted in quotations.
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Abbreviations should be used this way without adding any comma, e.g.:

*CIL* X 1234

*IG* XIV 904

*SEG* 28.1432
