Please follow the signs used by the Supplementum Epigraphicum Graecum for Greek inscriptions and by L'Année Épigraphique for Latin inscriptions.

Style

- Every article should include an abstract in English, maximum of 100-150 words, and the translation of the title in English, if it is written in another language, as well as a list of keywords in English.
- Page layout should not be attempted and automatic text formatting should be avoided.
- Notes should be presented as footnotes. Footnote numbers should be placed outside the punctuation.
- Dates to be phrased this way, using small caps for the letters: 250 B.C./250 A.D. (for papers in English). For other languages, use the following: 250 a.C./250 p.C. (French); 250 v. Chr./250 n. Chr. (German); 250 a.C./250 d.C. (Italian and Spanish).
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- Quotations in angle brackets («...»); double quotes ("...") for material inserted in quotations.
